Take home a beautiful handmade wreath and enjoy great company with us this December.


Design and decorate your own holiday card and explore the grounds in a nature mystery scavenger hunt.

New Rhoneymeade Updates



"The 2005 bronze sculpture Tulipa was created specifically for the Rhoneymeade Arboretum and Sculpture Garden. Richard Morgan, Rhoneymeade's founder, commissioned the work for a site on the northwest corner of the sculpture grounds.

Richard was intrigued by a concept that he called "three fold symmetry". His wish was to have a bronze that would speak to this vision. The environment in which the sculpture would preside also used the three fold concept. A landscape plan was created that invited visitors to select one of three entrances, each of which, spiraled inward. A meditative resting place for both sculpture and viewer completed each spiral.

Our discussions of nature and symmetry lead me to produce sketches, maquettes and a 3' wax form that would be cast in bronze. My desire was to honor both Richard's vision and the quiet natural setting for the work.

A.R.T. (Art Research & Technology) of Lancaster, PA invited Richard and I to view and participate in the casting of the finished work.

Time and the elements have made Tulipa's patina richer and it's setting more mature. The recent addition of a stone plinth and capstone help complete the site, and hopefully Richard's

vision. Surely, a full realization of that vision would include Rhoneymeade's visitors ... sitting or standing inside that quiet spot."

# 3 Ways to Help Rhoneymeade GROW and THRIVE

#### 1. The Century Tree Adoption Project

Adopt a tree planted 100 years ago! Your contribution will aid in care for this tree by a professional arborist. A plaque bearing the name of the tree, your name or someone you wish to memorialize will be inscribed on an indestructible bronze plaque at the base of the tree

### 2. The Aldo Leopold Bench Project

Purchase a hand-carved bench made with locally sourced wood bearing your name or the name of someone you may wish to memorialize. Aldo Leopold, a beloved environmentalist, liked simple but firm structure. The bench will be placed on Rhoneymeade property to be used by all visitors. The plaque is made of weather resistant material and will be secured to the back of the bench.

## 3. Adopt a Rhone House Room Project

Adopting a room in the Rhone house will contribute to appropriate historic restoration from floors to ceiling. The name of the room along with your name will be inscribed on a beautiful bronze plaque placed outside of the room entrance.
